Tuesday Oct. 8th Three of the Oklahoma City group will be landing at noon. Two are driving in shortly thereafter. Whomever can join the hosts at the airport should plan on being there about 11:30 AM. We can meet on the departure level by the windows near the American Airlines check in. We can then go to Shorewood West (5545 E Evergreen Blvd, Vancouver, WA 98661). Georgie will encourage them to bring their swim suits. Hosts can give them the option of swimming, settling in, going down to see the Vancouver Waterfront area or old Fort Vancouver. The Welcome Dinner will be at Donna Eagan's home at 4:30 PM at 12321 SE Evergreen Highway, Vancouver, WA. Aggie and Mike, Rodger and Mary will come ahead of time to set up. Salmon, scalloped potatoes and green beans. Members will bring desserts. Please let Georgie know if you are bringing dessert. Coffee, lemonade and wine will be provided. Member's cost will be \$12.00. Let Georgie know if you can stay to help clean up. Emily will pass out the gift bags she is making and Laural will put together our week's guide books.

- 3. Within 15 days of making your deposit, if you want the FFI travel insurance, go to the website listed above and purchase your insurance. Doing so within that time frame covers you for any pre-existing conditions. Insurance covers fixed costs like FFI fees, Journey fees, and airline tickets.
- Begin researching flights and their costs. Include those costs when you purchase your insurance.

Gaggle Communication by Bill Gregory

Our club has members with centuries worth of knowledge and experience. On top of that we're willing to share and help each other! But how can we draw upon this wealth of resources? One way is to join our new email discussion group. Here are some questions and answers about the discussion group:

Why not just ask Georgie and Dick to send email to the group?

All formal communications that must go to all members should still go through Georgie and Dick. However, if you want to start an informal discussion then our email discussion group might be useful.

What kinds of topics might one discuss?

Here are some examples:

- I'd like to go to the annual picnic, but my car is in the shop. Could someone give me a ride?
- My guest from Costa Rica doesn't speak English. Anyone out there willing to teach me a few Spanish phrases and pronunciation?
- I'm having a hard time trying to get a cheap flight to the Florida journey. Any suggestions?
- Would anyone like to carpool to the airport for our Wichita journey? We could split the airport parking fee.
- I'm going on an hour walk around Tryon Park Saturday morning at 10. If you'd like to join me, let's meet at the nature house.

What tool do we use for this discussion group?

Email: use whatever email system you are accustomed to: Google, Yahoo, Outlook, whatever.

Do I need training?

No: if you can send and receive email, you can do it.

How does this work?

- 1. Set up a new mail contact with this email address: ffcc@gaggle.email
- 2. Send an email to the new contact.
- 3. A company called Gaggle receives your email and sends it to all of our club members who have chosen to participate in the email group. (Participation is optional.)
- 4. When you get an email from the group the subject of the message will always begin with "[Friendship Force Columbia Cascade]" so you'll know the message is coming from someone in our club.
- 5. If you want to reply to a message, just do it the same way you reply to any other email. There is no need to hit Reply **All** since Gaggle will distribute the message to everyone by default.

I'm interested in joining the email discussion group. What do I do?

Foster children benefit from the generosity of FFCC members & neighbors

Foster children in the US often move from one foster home to another with all their worldly possessions carried in a black plastic garbage bag! What message do you think that implants in their impressionable young minds? FFCC members are collecting clean and usable suitcases, duffel bags, and backpacks to donate to the Department of Human Services for use by local foster kids.



I explained the program to my Austrian Ambassadors, Franz and Renate Langsam, and they pledged to go back to Austria and find out how foster children there transport their goods. If they face a similar situation, Franz and Renate will propose that their club collect bags to donate. On the last day of their visit here, we delivered 25 more bags. Hopefully, our Ambassadors can start similar programs!

This is so easy to do! I go to garage sales in my neighborhood, scout out bags, and ask the sellers to donate them if they don't sell by the end of the sale. I have never been turned down, and have collected over 50 bags this way. I even have people dropping them on my doorstep! So far, FFCC has donated 104 bags to Oregon Department of Human Services. I hope that others will follow this example. It's a great way to spread the word about FFCC



and do something useful with the bags that we no longer need in our travels! I'd like to see our Vancouver members become active with this project, and we will donate them in Vancouver. If we can donate in Portland and Vancouver, and have our Ambassadors spread the word in their clubs, perhaps this can become a world-wide FFI project. Wouldn't it be great if foster kids could have something nice to own and use?



15 Photos A Travel Writer Will Never Sell

Not every photo you snap has to be a winner. Some images aren't meant to be sold at all. Instead, their job is saving time and money.

Travel writers are information collectors. We illuminate our stories with photos we take of attractions, accommodations, food, and drink. But we also need to collect brochures, guides, maps, books, and business cards. Plus, reservations, confirmations, boarding passes, addresses, phone numbers, departure gates, and so much more.

For these things, I use my smart phone or camera to reduce paper while still keeping essential information at my fingertips.

The following are 15 kinds of photos I snap to save time and money...

1 ID and documents

You know this one. Photograph the front and back of your passport, driver's license, journalist ID, credit cards, tickets, itineraries, and vouchers before leaving home. Leave a copy at home with your itinerary, place one in your suitcase (I put mine under the lining), and some folks suggest putting the third copy in a secure location as you travel—money belt, safe, etc.

2 Luggage and its contents

Photograph the contents of your bags as you are packing. Pack everything and photograph all your bags—suitcases, totes, handbags, and wallets.

Leave a digital copy at home and place one on your phone and/or laptop. If your luggage is lost or stolen, you'll have an easier time with insurance claims by including photos.

3 Departure board that shows your gate

Keep it handy for reference when finding your gate.

4 Rental car condition at pickup and return

Photograph all sides clearly. Get the rental car agent in the picture if possible. This can be your savior if damage claims are made for pre-existing flaws.

5 Hotel from the street

This shot can be handy if you don't speak the same language as your cab driver, or in case you forget the name or location.

6 Hotel room number

In case you don't want to say it out loud or forget the number.

7 Your car parked in the parking lot

Be sure the specific row or level shows in the photo. If that's not possible, photograph the

location sign separately. Nothing worse than roaming up and down row after row of cars looking for yours.

8 Parking lot name/address sign

In case you forget, this is a life saver. I've used the Google feature, "Place on Map" with parking lot photos when I was lost to get step-by-step walking or driving directions.

9 Taxi driver ID

Most likely you won't need this one, but I do wish I had done it for the taxi where I left my London Fog raincoat.

10 All Receipts

11Brochures

It's easier to carry a digital image than all the paper that accumulates while traveling.

12 Business cards

13 Menus

So you can refer back to the names of dishes and their prices in your articles. It's lighter to carry a digital image than carry a menu from eateries, not to mention they might not give you one. Be discreet. I ask first and like to do it outside the dining area.

14 Signs

Business names and addresses, informational, directional, etc.

15 Museum information panels

Most of these photos can be deleted after your trip is complete or you've finished your story. But in the interim, they're priceless.
